A RESOLUTION To honor the memory of Carrie C. Repass
Warrick.

WHEREAS, The members of this General Assembly were greatly saddened to learn of the death of Carrie C. Repass Warrick; and

WHEREAS, Mrs. Warrick was an exemplary woman who strove with loving dedication to improve the quality of life for her fellow citizens in numerous capacities; and

WHEREAS, A Washington County native, she was the daughter of the late Robert Emmett and Myrtle Cornett Repass; and

WHEREAS, A sterling scholar, Carrie C. Repass Warrick was a 1922 graduate of Carson-Newman College, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree and Bachelor of Music Degree; she completed two years of post-graduate studies at Bohlman School of Music at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, and in 1994 received an honorary Doctorate of Music from Washington College Academy; and

WHEREAS, Mrs. Warrick meritoriously served as a Piano and Theory Teacher at Washington College Academy from 1924-1970; the very epitome of the conscientious and committed educator, she made a positive difference in the lives of countless young people; and

WHEREAS, She was a highly respected member of her community and was named "Teacher of the Year" by the Tennessee Music Teachers Association in 1977. In 1998, she received the "Distinguished Teacher Award" from the Federation of Music Clubs; and

WHEREAS, An accomplished musician, Carrie C. Repass Warrick is listed in the International *Who's Who of Musicians* and the World's *Who's Who of Women*; and

WHEREAS, In addition to being a skilled educator and musician, Mrs. Warrick was also a talented author; and

WHEREAS, She was a valuable member of the Shubert Club, the Monday Club, and the Limestone Chapter 262 Order of the Eastern Star, where she was a former Worthy Matron; and

WHEREAS, Carrie C. Repass Warrick was a devout member and elder of the Salem Presbyterian Church, where she faithfully served as an organist and choir director for over seventy-five years; and

WHEREAS, Mrs. Warrick was deeply devoted to her family and considered them to be a great blessing in her life; as a wife and mother, she made her home a joyful haven; and

WHEREAS, She enjoyed the love and support of her husband, Luther "Luke" Martin Warrick, who preceded her in death; and

WHEREAS, Carrie C. Repass Warrick will be sorely missed by her daughter and son-in-law, Joan W. and Willford Padgett; her daughter, Jane W. DeVault; her sister, Lou Holman; her four grandchildren, Martin Padgett, Martha Crady, Carrie Houle, and Frederick "Trip" DeVault; four great-grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews; and

WHEREAS, A kind neighbor and citizen, Mrs. Warrick was a wonderful human being, loved by all who were privileged to have known her; and

WHEREAS, She leaves behind an indelible legacy of integrity in public life, compassion and loyalty in private life, and faith and dedication in all her chosen endeavors; and

WHEREAS, It is fitting that this General Assembly should pause to remember the bountiful life of this exceptional human being; now, therefore,
