FISCAL NOTE

SB 1110 - HB 1181

March 10, 2013

**SUMMARY OF BILL:** Prohibits someone from reentering premises for a two-year period if such person intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly caused bodily injury to another at a public sporting event. A second occurrence would result in a five year prohibition, and a third offense would result in a lifetime prohibition. The prohibition applies even if the person was not charged with assault or aggravated assault.

A person who enters or remains on a public sporting event's premises after being prohibited from being on such premises commits criminal trespass and is guilty of a Class C misdemeanor.

**ESTIMATED FISCAL IMPACT:**

**NOT SIGNIFICANT**

Assumptions:

- There will not be a sufficient number of misdemeanor prosecutions for local government to experience any significant increase in revenue or expenditures.
- Due to the low number of convictions the bill would result in, it is assumed that the courts, district attorneys, and public defenders can accommodate any impact to their caseloads within existing resources.
