AMEND Senate Bill No. 1*

House Bill No. 142

by deleting subsection (f) in its entirety in the amendatory language of SECTION 10 of the bill as amended by amendment #2037 and substituting instead the following:

(f)

(1) Upon receipt of the standing committees' recommendations and within the appropriate sixty-day period, established in accordance with § 17-4-103, the general assembly shall meet in joint session for the purpose of voting either to confirm or reject the governor's appointee.

(2)

(A) The chief clerk of the house of representatives shall call the roll of the representatives, who shall audibly vote to "confirm" or "reject" the appointee or vote "present not voting." Each representative's vote shall equal one (1) point. The chief clerk shall calculate and announce the total number of points corresponding to representatives' votes to "confirm" and the total number of points to "reject."

(B) The chief clerk of the senate shall call the roll of the senators, who shall audibly vote to "confirm" or "reject" the appointee or vote "present not voting." Each senator's vote shall equal three (3) points. The chief clerk shall calculate and announce the total number of points corresponding to senators' votes to "confirm" and the total number of points to "reject."

(3) The total number of points of the representatives and senators corresponding to votes to "confirm" shall be added together and announced, and

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the total number of points of the representatives and senators corresponding to votes to “reject” shall be added together and announced.

(4)

(A) A tabulation of one hundred (100) points or more to “confirm” results in the appointee being confirmed by the general assembly.

(B) A tabulation of one hundred (100) points or more to “reject” results in the appointee being rejected by the general assembly.

(5) If a vote results in any other outcome, then no action is taken and both houses may vote again to confirm or reject, subject to § 17-4-103(b).
