WHEREAS, Ms. Pollard served as chairman in 1999 for *The Heritage of Morgan County, Tennessee 1817-1999*, which was later dedicated to her in recognition of her hard work; she also worked with Judy Cromwell on a book about the Civil War; and

WHEREAS, Jean Pollard wrote a book about the town of Gobey last year, and she is currently working on two more books; and

WHEREAS, she was a part of the Geological Historical Society in 1987 and chairman of the Bicentennial Committee in 1996, and she served on the Economic Development Board for a number of years; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Pollard has volunteered in the Morgan County Archives for nine years, preserving courthouse records; and

WHEREAS, Jean Pollard epitomizes the spirit and commitment that are characteristic of a true Tennessean; and

WHEREAS, the members of this General Assembly find it appropriate to acknowledge and applaud Ms. Pollard for her many contributions to the State of Tennessee and its citizens; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED ELEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE, THE SENATE CONCURRING, that we honor and commend Morgan County historian Jean Pollard and extend to her our best wishes for every success in her future endeavors.
