FISCAL MEMORANDUM

HB 794 - SB 1082

April 17, 2019

SUMMARY OF ORIGINAL BILL: Authorizes any establishment, which is currently authorized to sell wine and high alcohol content beer for consumption on its premises, to also serve wine or high alcohol content beer.

FISCAL IMPACT OF ORIGINAL BILL:

NOT SIGNIFICANT

SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS (008058, 008458): Amendment 008058 deletes all language after the enacting clause. Authorizes a licensed manufacturer of alcoholic beverages to include in the entity's designation any contiguous area owned or controlled by the entity for purposes of on-premises consumption of alcoholic beverages and beer.

Requires that the alcohol awareness training required of applicants for a server permit be at least three and one-half hours in length.

Authorizes any business in the Beale Street Historic District, which serves alcoholic beverages for on-premises consumption, to serve such beverages to customers seated at tables and chairs contiguous to the outside front wall. Such authority is subject to Memphis's right of ownership and control and any conditions, rules, regulations imposed by Memphis or its lawful designee.

Amendment 008458 deletes Sections 1 and 2 of the bill as amended by amendment 008058 which authorized a licensed manufacturer of alcoholic beverages to include in the entity's designation any contiguous area owned or controlled by the entity for purposes of on-premises consumption of alcoholic beverages and beer, and required that the alcohol awareness training required of applicants for a server permit be at least three and one-half hours in length.

FISCAL IMPACT OF BILL WITH PROPOSED AMENDMENTS:

Unchanged from the original fiscal note.

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Assumptions for the bill as amended:

- Currently, businesses on Beale Street can sell wine, high alcohol content beer, and liquor to patrons; however, they cannot serve such beverages to patrons residing outside the entrance to the restaurants and seated at tables and chairs contiguous to the outside front wall of the restaurant or bar, despite their current ability to serve low alcohol content beer to patrons seated in identical fashion.
- Currently, patrons that wish to be served wine, high alcohol content beer, or liquor must enter into the restaurant to be served by restaurant staff.
- This legislation is estimated to have no significant impact on liquor-by-the-drink, wholesale, or state and local sales and use tax collections.
