



HB 1129 - SB 1123

February 25, 2020

SUMMARY OF ORIGINAL BILL: Changes, from December 31 to December 15, the annual date by which the Department of Health (DOH) and the Department of Human Services (DHS) must jointly provide a written list of available state and federal options under Medicaid and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) to the Health and Welfare Committee of the Senate and the Health Committee of the House of Representatives.

FISCAL IMPACT OF ORIGINAL BILL:

NOT SIGNIFICANT

SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS (011503, 015408): Amendment 011503 deletes all language after the caption. Requires persons who tend to one or more hooved mammals, for the purpose of producing milk to be consumed by independent or partial owners of the hooved mammal, to do the following:

- Complete a safe milk handling course from the University of Tennessee's Agricultural Extension Service.
- Register with the Department of Agriculture.
- Maintain registration with the Department by:
 - Maintaining records regarding transactions of unpasteurized milk,
 - Maintaining a warning form signed annually by each partial owner, and
 - Completing continued education every two years after the initial safe milk handling course.

Requires the farm owners who tend to the hooved mammals to put a warning label as described in the proposed legislation on all milk products distributed. Requires the Department to create a warning label and make it available for free on its website.

Persons who have registered with the Department as described above, and that wish to participate in the Tennessee Agriculture Enhancement Program (Program) are eligible to receive funds from the Program for the procurement of dairy equipment and processing equipment that promotes public health, including, but not limited to, equipment for pasteurizing, testing, and bottling milk.

Requires farm owners to cooperate with the Departments of Health and Agriculture if a contamination outbreak occurs on a farm registered pursuant to this proposed legislation.

Permits the Department of Agriculture to assess a civil penalty to any individual who violates the rules of this proposed legislation.

Amendment 015408 deletes and replaces language of the bill as amended by amendment 015408 to clarify the type of information farm owners are required to maintain.

FISCAL IMPACT OF BILL WITH PROPOSED AMENDMENTS:

Unchanged from the original fiscal note.

Assumptions for the bill as amended:

- The institutions to which these dairy farms will pay fees associated with completing the required sanitation course, as well as the extent of any such course fee, is unknown. Given the relatively small number of dairy farms expected to engage in the business of unpasteurized products, it is assumed that any fee revenue to any particular institution offering the required sanitation course would be not significant.
- Due to the estimated low number of dairy farms, it is assumed that the proposed legislation will not impact total state funding allocated to or disbursed under the Program. Therefore, any net impact to state expenditures is estimated to be not significant.
- Any revenue from the assessment of civil penalties is estimated to be not significant.
