SUBJECT: **SB 2761 - HB 3232**

This bill, if enacted, will add the new aggravating circumstance that the victim was 60 years of age or older for which punishment of first degree murder may be a sentence of life without parole or death.

The fiscal impact from enactment of this bill is estimated to be an increase in state expenditures of \$163,200 for incarceration*. The details of the inmate population growth and costs are shown below:
