AMEND Senate Bill No. 783*

House Bill No. 1204

by deleting all language after the enacting clause and substituting instead the following:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 67-6-103(d)(1)(A)(iii), is amended by adding the following language immediately before the last sentence of the subdivision:

In any county with a population greater than four hundred thousand (400,000) according to the 2010 federal census or any subsequent federal census, if the stadium described in this subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iii) is placed in service after December 31, 2020, and on or before December 31, 2025, and the projected cost of private development expected by the county to be constructed proximate to the stadium exceeds one hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000), then the amount of state and local tax revenue distributed to the entity includes all such revenue derived from any sales that occur within a distance of one-quarter (0.25) mile from the center point of the stadium to the extent such state and local tax revenues exceed any such state and local tax revenues collected from the same area in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020. With regard to the extended area created within the quarter-mile radius, sales tax revenues shall not be allocated pursuant to this subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iii) from any parcel from which more than five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in state and local sales tax revenues were received during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021, in order to assure that businesses that were active during such fiscal year are not included; the commissioner of finance and administration must confirm the specific parcels to be included in the area to ensure compliance with this subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iii); and such sales tax revenues generated from within the area must be used only to pay debt service relating to the financing of the initial construction



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of the stadium and related public infrastructure, including any refinancing, and such allocations continue until the debt is retired.

SECTION 2. This act takes effect July 1, 2021, the public welfare requiring it.

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AMEND Senate Bill No. 772

House Bill No. 773*

by deleting all language after the enacting clause and substituting instead the following:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 67-6-217, is amended by deleting subsection (b) in its entirety and substituting instead the following language:

(b)

(1) For purposes of this section:

(A) "Air carrier" means any person, firm, corporation, or entity providing air transportation of passengers or property;

(B) "Tax year" means a period beginning on July 1 and ending on the following June 30; and

(C) "Transportation hub" means a location in this state from which there originates fifty (50) or more flight departures five (5) days per week for six (6) or more months during the calendar year and where passengers or property are regularly exchanged at the location between flights of the same or a different certificated or licensed air carrier.

(2) The tax imposed and remitted on a person's purchase, use, consumption, or storage of aviation fuel, pursuant to subsection (a), that is used in the operation of an aircraft of a certificated or licensed air carrier with a transportation hub within this state, shall not exceed the following:

(A) Seven million five hundred thousand dollars (\$7,500,000) for the period of July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022; and



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(B) Five million dollars (\$5,000,000) for any tax year occurring on or after July 1, 2022.

(3) The commissioner shall establish a process for applying the cap provided by this subsection (b).

SECTION 2. This act takes effect July 1, 2021, the public welfare requiring it.

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AMEND Senate Bill No. 875

House Bill No. 214*

by deleting all language after the enacting clause and substituting instead the following:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Title 43, Chapter 1, Part 1, is amended by adding the following new section:

(a) There is created the farm and forestry task force, hereinafter referred to as the "task force," composed of farmers and foresters to develop and implement a strategic plan to position this state as a leading hub for agri-tech and value-added agriculture.

(b)

(1) The task force consists of nine (9) members from this state, including at least six (6) full-time farmers or foresters who derive their primary income from crop, forestry, or livestock production, or directly related farming activities such as agritourism, on-farm education, or farmer-owned value-added activities. The task force must also include three (3) residents with a controlling interest in an agricultural business that is engaged in local processing or agricultural-related innovation.

(2) The members of the task force must represent diverse segments of the agriculture industry, including crops, livestock, local food, and urban agriculture.

(3) Appointments to the task force may be made by the governor from lists of qualified nominees submitted by interested agricultural groups, including, but not limited to, the Tennessee Farm Bureau Federation, the Center for



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Profitable Agriculture, Tennessee Farmers Cooperative, Launch Tennessee, and AgLaunch Initiative. The governor shall consult with such interested groups to determine qualified persons to fill the positions.

(c) Members of the task force shall elect a chair from their membership.

(d) Members of the task force shall commence the process of developing a statewide strategy for agriculture innovation and entrepreneurship, led by the task force, with input from the state's universities, state departments, state commodity organizations, the agriculture and forestry industry, companies, and other interested stakeholders.

(e) The task force must be managed through the department of agriculture.

(f) In making appointments, the governor shall strive to ensure that the task force is composed of members who represent the geographic, urban, rural, and economic diversity of this state and who are diverse in race, sex, perspective, and experience.

(g) The commissioner of agriculture shall call the first meeting of the task force, which must conduct at least three (3) regularly scheduled meetings per year to hear testimony from members of the public and to solicit input from persons with expertise in:

(1) Current agricultural practices;

(2) Forecasting trends related to consumer purchasing patterns, product development, crop diversity, and agricultural technologies; and

(3) The economic impact of agriculture on rural and urban areas of this state.

(h) The chair of the task force may call on appropriate state agencies for reasonable assistance in the work of the task force.

(i) The members of the task force serve without compensation.

(j) The task force shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the general assembly no later than June 30, 2022, including an implementation plan and

recommended legislative action. The task force recommendations may include continuation of the task force through the implementation stage.

(k) This section is repealed on July 1, 2022.

SECTION 2. This act takes effect upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it.

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AMEND Senate Bill No. 427

House Bill No. 540*

by deleting all language after the enacting clause and substituting instead the following:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 54-5-708(1), is amended by designating the existing language as subdivision (A) and adding the following as a new subdivision:

(B) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, any state community colleges that are within the service area of Roane State Community College, located in any county having a population of not less than forty thousand seven hundred (40,700) nor more than forty thousand eight hundred (40,800), according to the 2010 federal census, or any subsequent federal census, and located within five (5) miles of Interstate 75, must be signed pursuant to subdivision (1)(A) regardless of the number of students enrolled in the colleges.

SECTION 2. This act takes effect upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it.



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
